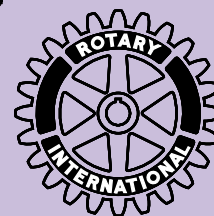

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Spare a thought for the New Generation

If you look at the history of Rotary in Australia you will appreciate that the welfare of young people has been a preoccupation of all Rotary Clubs throughout the years.

As a means of instilling the "ideal of service" in young people, Rotary clubs have been encouraged to sponsor the formation of junior service clubs: **Interact and Rotaract**.

Sadly the number of these clubs in our district has declined over recent years and we now have only twelve Interact clubs and four Rotaract clubs.

To sponsor an **Interact** club a Rotary club needs the permission of the school principal and the assistance of at least one teacher in the school to act as a co-ordinator. The role of the Rotarians is to attend meetings of the Interact club and to provide advice and information when requested.

The purpose of a **Rotaract** club is to stimulate among its members acceptance of high ethical standards in all occupations, to develop leadership and responsible citizenship through service and to promote international understanding and peace.

The Rotary Club of Brisbane West sponsored the first Rotaract club in Australia on 22nd May 1968 at International House at the University of Queensland. Growth was rapid in the 1960s and 70s but has tailed off in recent years. Should we not be more proactive in assisting in the growth of Rotaract clubs?

RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) started in Queensland in 1959 during the celebrations of the centenary of its proclamation as a separate colony. Rotary clubs from around the state selected young leaders aged 18 to 25 to visit Brisbane for ten days where they attended many social functions and experienced the cultural and vocational activities of the city.

From this evolved our seven-day seminar type **RYLA** as we know it today for 18 to 28 year olds. **RYLA** was adopted as a program of Rotary International at the International Convention in Sydney in 1971.

RYPEN (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment) was an activity that grew out of **RYLA** and was devised by the Rotary Club of Canberra-Belconnen in 1980. It is a weekend seminar for boys and girls aged 14 to 16 years not necessarily the high achievers but average young people who are likely to benefit from the learning experience.

RYTS (Rotary Youth Transition Seminar) is to cater for school leavers who have completed grade 12 and helps them adapt to adult life.

MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly) is all about building bridges of goodwill for world peace and understanding in the minds of youth. It is an international program conducted annually in our district and in all other Australian districts.

These programs together with our educational programs for young people such as **NYSF** (National Youth Science Forum), **Siemens** Science Experience, **Honeywell** Engineering School and exchange programs **YEP** (Youth Exchange Program) and **SME** (Student Matched Exchange) make up a comprehensive package of New Generation programs for which we as Rotarians can be very proud.

Continued support for these programs will surely see our future leaders, our youth, better equipped for the many challenges that lie ahead.

Bill's overseas aid recognised by Govt

(The following is a recent article which appeared in the Daily News circulating on the Darling Downs and Granite Belt)

Stanthorpe Rotarian Bill Bonner has been recognised for another chapter in his history of international community service. Bill has received two Certificates of Appreciation from the Federal Government this year for his part in aid missions.

The first was for helping build houses in Fiji, and the second was for his trip to study orphanages in Indonesia.

"We found an orphanage there with no beds. I'm hoping to raise money with the help of Rotary clubs to provide 47 beds for this orphanage," Bill said.

Bill said that visiting orphanages in Indonesia was "fairly humbling".

"Most of the children were from East Timor," he said.

Member for Maranoa Bruce Scott said volunteers played a vital role in the government's overseas aid program.

"In 2000-2001, almost 1000 Australian volunteers represented Australia overseas as either volunteers or as Youth Ambassadors," he said.

Diabetes is the commonest cause of blindness worldwide in people under 60 years of age and diabetics are 30 times more likely to go blind than non-diabetics. Blindness is largely preventable if the diabetes is strictly controlled by medication, diet and exercise, in conjunction with control of elevated blood pressure and reduction of blood cholesterol levels.

Diabetic blindness is caused principally by a disease process which interferes with circulation of fine blood vessels within the retina. This condition is called diabetic retinopathy. At the early stage, the disease can be detected by expert examination of the retina. At this stage laser treatment to the diseased retina can produce a 98% cure rate.

Diabetes is becoming an increasingly common global disease especially in Pacific Islanders and indigenous Australians.

It is believed that more than 20% of Fijians have diabetes.

Dr Malcolm Tester of the Rotary Club of Summerland Sunrise noticed this problem during volunteer work in Fiji starting in 1983. His survey conducted in 1996, and which he published, revealed that over 60% of the 500 diabetics examined were either blind or had severe sight threatening diabetic retinopathy.

The Beam of Hope Project was born as a consequence of this study. It involved the purchase of retinal laser equipment and the establishment of a clinic in Suva.

The cost was estimated at AUS \$240,000 and has been achieved from fundraising in Australia and from a significant 3H Grant from The Rotary Foundation.

Malcolm and a team of Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Summerland Sunrise will visit Suva for a week in November to set the project in motion again after it suffered a setback during and after the coup when the public awareness program was suspended.



Rotary Centre for International Studies

Our District has been designated by the Rotary Foundation Trustees as a Host Area District for the Rotary Centres for International Studies at University of Queensland.

We join Districts 9600 and 9630 in this distinction.

Rotarian Neil Russell of the Rotary Club of Southport North will serve as our representative on the seminar committee which will be responsible for training Rotarians at the Club and District level on our responsibilities in hosting Rotary World Peace Scholars.

Selection of the 2002-2004 Rotary World Peace Scholars on a world competitive basis will take place in November this year.

Our District does not have any nominees for the first intake but we are hoping for more interest once the program is established.

New Criteria for Presidential Citation

RI President Richard King has announced changes in the Presidential Citation Program. The Education and Training requirements have been relaxed. Clubs are no longer required to complete all five achievements.

Instead, they may complete four out of five and still qualify for the citation.

Chris "rocks" young world

Sculptor Chris McKenzie has been rocking the world of young Goondiwindi people for the past four months. Chris has been the resident artist at the Goondiwindi State Primary School while working on a three-piece series that celebrates Goondiwindi and the Centenary of Federation.

That project has now come to an end but he will be back later in the year to help with moving the pieces from their present location at the State Primary School to their presentation area adjacent to the old Border Bridge.

Over the period he has chiselled away at the sandstone monoliths with sweat, a bit of blood and occasionally a hint of a tear or two. His three pillars of Goondiwindi feature representations of river, fields, and water with panels of water-birds to mark Goondiwindi's links with its past, present and future - and its environment. The \$25,000 project was funded by Queensland's Council for the Centenary of Federation and managed by the Goondiwindi Rotary Club.

Rotarian, Immediate Past President Lew Verney, deputy principal of the Primary School and chairman of the District Conference Organising Committee thinks that besides his great work on the sculptures, Chris has been a wonderful influence on the students. Lew wants him to come back to do a piece for the school.



Cancer Research Is Our Business

What is Muna?

Rotary Model United Nations Assembly or MUNA is all about building bridges of goodwill for world peace and understanding in the minds of our youth.

MUNA challenges our youth to respect and tolerate differences of race, religion and nationalism whilst retaining their own individualism and the best of their national traditions.

MUNA as a concept arose in North America from the desire of young people to simulate the great debates of the United Nations Assembly.

It was introduced to Australia by the Lake Cargelligo Rotary Club in 1980.

In 1988 Forbes Rotary Club undertook MUNA 88 - a Rotary Bicentennial Project for Youth.

MUNA has spread throughout Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and world wide.

The United Nations has given enthusiastic support for the ongoing growth of this worthwhile project for youth.

MUNA is now conducted in all five continents of the world and aims to operate in each of the 530 Rotary Districts world wide.

MUNA calls for teams of three or four senior students from Secondary Schools to debate selected topics concerning world affairs. Each team represents a different country.

The first National MUNA was held in the Australian Parliament in August 1997.

Our District was represented by two young students at the recent National MUNA forum which was conducted in Old Parliament House, Canberra on the weekend of 25th & 26th August. Thirty nations were represented at the forum by more than eighty senior school students from around Australia. Dressed in an array of traditional costumes the team members represented countries of their choice and were assisted by representatives from the Embassies of Argentina, Sweden, South Africa, the Philippines and the British High Commission.

Our two students represented the Philippines and did so with great credit.

Margaret Hayes of the Rotary Club of Kingscliff who is our representative on the National MUNA Committee has been elected to the position of National Secretary, a position she will hold for several years. Congratulations Margaret.

District 9640 will conduct a MUNA at Robina Cultural Centre on 16th & 17th March 2002. Clubs are encouraged to start thinking about nominating teams for this wonderful event.

Indigenous Australian Engineering Summer School

The University of New South Wales is conducting the Summer School in January 2002 in cooperation with Engineering Aid.

Clubs in this District are invited to nominate indigenous students to attend.

The Summer School is Engineering Aid's principal program on behalf of Indigenous young people currently studying in years 10 to 12 and aims to encourage them to consider tertiary studies in engineering.

Students gain first hand experience of engineering, working in laboratories, using computers, visiting engineering projects and meeting role models.

They see what engineers do, including the contribution they make to community health, and how students who become engineers may contribute to the benefit of their communities.

Students from throughout Australia attend without cost to themselves. All expenses, including student travel and accommodation, are paid out of contributions made by sponsors and donors.

Scholarships are then available to selected year 11 and 12 students who attend Summer School and to those who go on to study engineering. In the case of the Secondary School students, the aim is to assist them to complete their secondary education. They are placed under no obligation to study engineering.
