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AAAARRRRGH!!!!

“Now is the time when all Rotary Club Presidents Elect decide the direction of their club during their Rotary year. This decision should be taken in line with their own intimate knowledge of the current state of affairs of their club. This decision should be taken without regard to the wishes of Rotary International or Rotary District 9640. All Rotary clubs are autonomous and we make the decisions.”

The above statement has been extracted from a Rotary Club Bulletin and whilst I recognise that it probably echoes the thoughts of the Bulletin Editor and not those of the Club, the statement, shocked me nevertheless.

The statement brings to mind one of Margaret Mead’s famous quotations which goes something like this:-
“Never doubt that a small, group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has.”

In the world scheme of things, in a world population of three billion people, we as 1.2 million Rotarians are only a small group of people, but we **are** changing the world! We **are** ridding the world of Polio! This mind boggling achievement has been possible, because Rotary has acted as a united force with a **common goal**. A hand full of soldier ants can be stood on and squashed by a largish animal. An army of soldier ants can bring down that same animal and strip it to the bare bones in a matter of hours.

Picture, if you will, the following scenario.

A Rotary International President Nominee is elected two years out

from his year of service. (I say “his”, because to date a woman has not yet held that position.

For the next two years that person will give over his life to Rotary at the expense of his private, family and business life. He will develop a theme for the year. He will develop a range of goals in line with the works of his predecessors and keeping in mind the goals of those who will follow him. He will assess the humanitarian needs of the world’s nations. He will attend training seminars and plan, in conjunction with the Evanston secretariat, an International Convention. Finally he will plan and conduct an International Assembly where the incoming District Governors for his year will also be trained and made aware of his goals. These Governors have also spent two years in preparation, in order to support the RI President. In Australia the incoming District Governor will have attended two six day Institutes prior to taking office and will attend a third during office. The District Governor will plan and organise District team training Seminars, District Leadership Seminars, Assistant Governor Training Seminars, PETS and District Assembly all with the aim of educating incoming District personnel and familiarizing them with the RI theme for the year and the R.I. goals..

Like the RI President, a Rotarian so committed to the Rotary ideals that he/she is willing to take on the job of District Governor will, most likely, have his/her own vision for the District. It is from this vision that those District Goals over and above the RI President’s Goals, emerge. It must be devastating then, for an incoming District Governor, to read an

item such as the above Bulletin extract and be hit with the chilling realisation that all that global investment of time and energy in training and planning is going to break down at the coal face, at least in the case of that particular club if the author has his way.

Yes, clubs are autonomous because they need to be able to respond to local issues, but will anything be achieved by a club making a conscious decision **not** to be a part of a very successful team? After all that global training and all that investment of time and energy in planning the year ahead, is it logical for clubs to say, "nah we don't want to be part of that"?

Anyone who has ever played for a sporting team can relate to the euphoric feeling of belonging to a winning team and let me tell you, Rotary is-a winning team that players should be proud to be part of.

During my rounds of club visits this year I made reference to the Rotary rowing boat and the necessity for each rower in the boat to be rowing in the same direction.

Presidents Elect, you are about to board the boat, so be fair to your helmsman and your fellow rowers and remember, your journey and that of your members, will be smoother if everyone rows in the same direction.

Polio Campaign recommences in Africa

Nigerian President Olusegun Obasanjo launched a round of National Immunization Days (NIDs) in Africa's most populous nation following the rescinding of a suspension on eradication activities by several of the country's northern states. The effort is part of a regional campaign to immunize at least 63 million children across west and central Africa to counter the spread of polio from northern Nigeria after an outbreak in October 2003 to other parts of Nigeria and into neighboring countries. Rumors that the oral polio vaccine contains harmful substances interrupted immunization activities and the resulting outbreak paralyzed nearly a dozen children in Burkina Faso, Ghana, Niger, and Togo, putting 15 million children in those countries at risk. The president's participation in the launch signals the end of a six-month controversy about the safety of the oral polio vaccine that hampered the efforts of the federal government and the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in achieving nationwide coverage in previous rounds of NIDs.

Dr Muhamamadu Maccido, president general of Jama'atu Nasril Islam and Nigerian Supreme Council for Islamic Affairs, who also holds the eminent position of ruler or Sultan of Sokoto, joined Obasanjo in calling for an end to the boycott of polio immunization and offered unequivocal support for the goals of polio eradication.

- f) *Displaying a **redundant** Disabled Driver's Authority and parking in a car place reserved for Disabled Drivers.*
- g) *Writing a good conduct reference for a driver who is about to lose his or her licence through the Loss of Points or from Driving Under the Influence.
(To say that: "this is out of character for this great pillar of society to have acted in this manner").*
- h) *To err from the truth in an endeavour to evade an unwanted or embarrassing situation.*
- i) *To use some other person's materials or writings as your own.*
- j) *To make unsavoury remarks about your work mates, or your employer, or your competitor's product.*

RI Strategic Planning

As part of Rotary International's strategic planning process, surveys on RI programs will be sent to about a *third of the Rotary clubs worldwide in July. District governors and governors-elect will be surveyed*

via email and their extranet, and focus groups will be conducted at the 2004 and 2005 RI conventions and at the 2004-05 Rotary zone institutes to elicit additional responses. The feedback will help RI sharpen its program focus, creating a more flexible structure that allows clubs to design service initiatives that meet community needs and make the best use of club resources. Participation in the survey will help ensure that RI's programs and service opportunities are relevant to Rotary clubs today. It will also help RI determine the effects of annual leadership changes on service and provide a basis for any changes to be brought to the 2007 Council on Legislation. Why is it so difficult to attract new members, especially younger people?

"Australian statistics show that people aged 25 to 35 years do volunteer work at approximately the same rate as people aged 55 to 65, but their areas of service differ. Some research provides evidence that younger people do not want to join organisations such as Rotary because they do not appreciate or understand the values or work of our association. There appears to be a significant need to restate what we do and why we do it if we are to attract the new generation to our membership."

THE FRED HOLLOWES FOUNDATION – BLINDNESS PREVENTION

Did you know that every 5 seconds someone in the world goes blind yet 80% of the world's blindness is avoidable? The Fred Hollows Foundation's vision is of a world where no one is needlessly blind. Its mission is to facilitate comprehensive and quality eye care with a focus on cataract. Our primary audience is disadvantaged people in developing countries.

The Fred Hollows Foundation has worked with local partners in more than 26 different countries in Africa, Asia, Papua New Guinea and the Pacific to restore sight to over one million people. The Foundation has also assisted in training more than 750 surgeons worldwide to perform modern cataract surgery.

Future directions include the continuing development of surgical techniques, effective hospital management approaches, local resource mobilisation initiatives and investment into R&D for intraocular lenses and other eye health technologies.

THE FRED HOLLOWES FOUNDATION – JAWOYN ASSOCIATION 'LITERACY FOR LIFE'

Following Fred Hollows early work with Indigenous people, The Fred Hollows Foundation is committed to advocate for and work with communities to support effective health programs for Indigenous Australians.

*There is a critical link between literacy and health. Research shows that people who do not complete secondary school have higher levels of unemployment, poverty and chronic health problems. At present, **adult literacy in remote Indigenous communities is only 7% and is decreasing.***

The 'Literacy for Life' program is part of a wider joint effort between The Fred Hollows Foundation and the Jawoyn Association, who are working together on a range of practical programs to improve the health of the Jawoyn communities in the Katherine region of the Northern Territory.

This is an exciting opportunity for Rotarians to become involved at the very beginning of a literacy program which could form the model for improving literacy in remote Indigenous communities throughout Australia.

*The first stage of the 'Literacy for Life' program will target **young mothers and pre-school infants**. Early intervention will give this group the best chance for improved health and the ability to cope at school in a foreign language – English.*

Funds will initially support a pre-school education program which will assist in the provision of literacy aids, playgrounds and equipment to help prepare children for school or for learning in English.

INTERPLAST NEWSLETTER

The first program for 2004 was conducted to Sri Lanka. The team was kept very busy working at the National Hospital in Colombo. Other programs have been conducted to Laos, Solomon Islands and Needs Assessments undertaken to Tanzania, Cambodia, and Myanmar.

April has been a busy month for Interplast with teams visiting Pakistan, the Philippines and a Needs Assessment in Bangladesh.

An evaluation of the Bali burns victims was undertaken 14 -16 March by surgeon Mark Duncan-Smith from the Royal Perth Hospital where many Balinese were treated.



Dr Htar Htar Aung has returned home to Myanmar after completing 12 months training with Interplast surgeons. Another surgeon from Myanmar, Dr Win Thun has been selected for 12 months training. He will arrive mid April and will train at the Prince of Wales Hospital in Sydney and St Vincents in Melbourne.

On Saturday 13th March a young girl Beverley Bade, aged 10 from PNG was operated on by Interplast surgeons at the Mater Hospital in Brisbane for a massive facial tumour. Following 9 hours of surgery Beverley required intensive care. She has now been discharged from hospital and is being cared for by the host family Elvira Kohn at Slacks Creek. Beverley's father Philip brought her to Brisbane and when Theresa from Interplast telephoned him after the operation, he kept saying over and over "She looks so beautiful"

FUNDING PARTNERS - OTHER HEALTH AREAS

(not Mental Illness)

Rotary Clubs or Districts are invited to form a partnership with the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund to jointly fund a research project grant or a research scholarship in an area of health that is not the current focus for the Fund.

THREE-YEAR PhD SCHOLARSHIP

A Rotary Club or Clubs, a University and the ARHRF can jointly fund a PhD Scholarship.

Scholarships - the ARHRF will contact available university/s local to the Club to help source a suitable scholar in the chosen area of health.

\$25,000 per annum per scholarship (for a three year commitment) is required:

\$10,000	from the Rotary Club
\$9,000	from the University; and
\$6,000	from the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund

RESEARCH PROJECT GRANT

A Rotary Club or Clubs or District and the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund can jointly

fund a research project grant.

The ARHRF will advertise the availability of a research grant in the geographical area local to the Rotary Club.

. A Funding Partners research project grant will total a minimum of \$30,000 or a maximum of \$60,000 for the annual grant.

. Half the grant will be paid by the Rotary Club and half by the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund.

. Grants may be offered for more than one year if the Club/District chooses.
